AMERICAN SYSTEMS Wins \$35 Million Contract Renewal

OOORAH! The spirit of the Marine Corps meshed with the spirit of AMERICAN SYSTEMS at our Dumfries, Virginia facility recently, as proud members of both institutions gathered to celebrate our \$35 Million contract renewal and kick off four more years of service to our country.

On April 30, 2008, AMERICAN SYSTEMS was awarded a \$34,801,258 blanket purchase agreement through the Marine Corps Systems Command for a comprehensive omnibus support contract to the U.S. Department of Defense and the Joint Non-Lethal Weapons (DoD/Joint NLW) program.

“The entire AMERICAN SYSTEMS team is honored to support the DoD/Joint NLW program through solutions that help our nation’s warfighters execute their missions while minimizing injuries and loss of life,” said Bill Hoover, president and CEO, AMERICAN

SYSTEMS. “This award will enable AMERICAN SYSTEMS to continue our work on behalf of the DoD/Joint NLW program and support emerging NLW technologies and capabilities.”

Under the terms of the purchase agreement, AMERICAN SYSTEMS is tasked with delivering an array of services, including requirements definition analysis; systems engineering; acquisition and program management; development and integration management; public affairs and web site support; and Combatant Command Liaison engagement requirements. The period of performance ends in December 2012.

AMERICAN SYSTEMS will perform a majority of the work from our Dumfries, Virginia, office and on-site at the Joint NLW Directorate in Quantico, Virginia, but employees from AMERICAN SYSTEMS and its teaming partners will be located through-

out the world at the geographic Combatant Commands and at the U.S. Army installation at Fort Leonard Wood, Missouri.

AMERICAN SYSTEMS has supported the DoD/Joint NLW Program Research, Development, Testing, and Evaluation (RDT&E) requirements since 1997, shortly after the DoD/Joint NLW Program was established by the DoD.

Supporting the Warfighter

AMERICAN SYSTEMS Assists with Mobile Video Initiative in Iraq

“We’re going to be one busy office next week,” said US Department of State Technology Development ST Branch Chief Mark Graves when he learned of the department’s October 5, 2007, announcement. Secretary Rice had just stated the need to capture video from the armored vehicle convoys in Iraq, which would allow Diplomatic Security (DS) to better understand the challenges faced by these armored details and provide valuable evidence for various causes. The very next working day, DS tasked ST to lead the development of a system capable of capturing and recording 360-degree video coverage from armored vehicles and deploy 25 such systems in Iraq before the end of 2007!

Developing a solution in record time

Cooperation among divisions across DS was the key to rapid completion. Among these divisions was the Technology Development Branch (FSE/TDB) which included several AMERICAN SYSTEMS employees; **Nelson Pontillo, Tracey Miller, Donald Dubuque,** and **Joe Warick** who oversaw

the evaluation and acquisition of the system components.

The mobile video development team quickly recognized that the primary system requirements hinged on the extreme environmental conditions in Iraq—namely the heat, pervasive sand, and rough road conditions. We also needed a system that required little attention from those operating the vehicle so they could stay focused on their primary mission. Last, this system had to be cost-effective and available for immediate testing and deployment.

On October 31st, the team came to its primary design decisions. First, the initial installations would be performed on late model Suburbans. Each Suburban would be equipped with seven cameras: one forward, four lateral, and two rear cameras. These would be connected to an Apollo Road Runner DVR, complete with a 750 GB hard drive, mounted in an environmentally-controlled and shock-resistant case.

Deployment of the mobile video solution

By the end of November the system was deemed ready for deployment. With Security Engineering Officer Dale Wills as the lead, a team of nine volunteers began preparing for the trip to Baghdad to begin the first phase of the mobile video installations.

Continued Efforts Back Home

While the first phase of the installation process was proceeding in Baghdad, the AMERICAN SYSTEMS surge team was called upon to provide system installation in vehicles prior to their deployment to Baghdad. The team came together for quick training and installation, and completed 45 vehicle installations in a two-week period. The government team leader was very impressed with the quality and work ethic of the AMERICAN SYSTEMS surge team; a special thanks to **Wade Dean, Errol Mishoe, Louvenia Dixon, Mike McKee,** and **Ed Spode.**

AMERICAN SYSTEMS Developing Training for Joint Strike Fighter Program

AMERICAN SYSTEMS’ Orlando office is currently working with Northrop Grumman Corporation (NGC) and several other domestic and international suppliers to develop web-based training and instructor-led training for the F-35 Lightning II Joint Strike Fighter program. The F-35 is the next generation strike fighter bringing cutting-edge technologies to the battle space of the future. Ultimately, the F-35 will be used by the United States Navy, Air Force, and Marine Corps.



The Orlando group began working with NGC a year ago to assist in the development of a collaborative work environment. All the suppliers develop the courseware in a single development tool, using a single database for media assets. While the aircraft is currently in the development phase, the courseware development is well under way and promises to be a long-term contract.

By incorporating over 75 lessons learned, the team improved their Board of Inspection and Survey scores in Communications by 20% and in Information Systems by 63%.

In addition, the T-AKE Information Assurance team reduced the cycle time on obtaining Authority to Operate from 16 months for T-AKE 1 to three months for T-AKE 3. In an environment with changing requirements, their hands-on approach and attention to detail resulted in faster and highly effective and coordinated installations. The T-AKE Team's initiative to improve their business processes and provide a quality product on time with cost savings for PEO C4I, SPAWAR and the fleet makes them worthy of this special recognition.”

AMERICAN SYSTEMS to Launch Identity Credentialing Pilot Program

AMERICAN SYSTEMS' Synchronized Pre-deployment and Operational Tracker (SPOT) team members are set to launch the latest in cross-credentialing systems at the Ft. Belvoir test location this July.

The Office of the Undersecretary of Defense for Acquisition, Technology, and Logistics (USD/AT&L) has chosen the Army's SPOT (Synchronized Pre-deployment and Operational Tracker) Program as the DoD-wide system to be used in identifying, supporting, and tracking defense contractor personnel who are imbedded within DoD units around the world.

Ft. Belvoir has been selected as the pilot installation location by AMC and USD/AT&L for preparing the system to be used across the DoD with its industry partners. As one aspect of this test, the Federation for Identity and Cross-Credentialing Systems (FiXs), a non-profit industry federation, was chosen to participate with AMC and Ft. Belvoir in this pilot. FiXs has collaborated extensively with the DoD on this inter-operable system since 2004.

Starting early in July, 2008, AMC and Ft. Belvoir will offer AMERICAN SYSTEMS and other companies under contract the opportunity to sign up for these new identity credentials. The companies must either be a current member of FiXs or become a subscriber member of FiXs to qualify for the pilot.

Once issued, the credentials may be used for base access, access to AMC headquarters, and access to other facilities around the base. New authentication stations will be placed at these sites and will be connected to the FiXs network and the defense Cross-Credentialing Identification System (DCCIS) for electronic authentication of the credential. The credentials may also be used to register in SPOT, so that the individual employees can have access to their own SPOT record.

This convergence of policy and infrastructure change places Ft. Belvoir, AMC, and AMERICAN SYSTEMS in the forefront of using these new technologies and business processes.

AMERICAN SYSTEMS to Develop Virtual Training for Taiwan Navy

On April 11, 2008, VSE Corporation awarded AMERICAN SYSTEMS' CCS group in Orlando a contract to develop a classroom trainer for EX-KIDD Class Guided Missile Destroyers (DDG 993) for the Taiwan Navy. This opportunity evolved as a result of the Taiwan Navy's desire to establish a technical training center in the most economical and efficient way, according to Dave Carney, the VSE project manager. This trainer concept is based on the AMERICAN SYSTEMS very successful physics-based F/A-18C Simulated Aircraft Maintenance Trainer (SAMT). The initial contract includes a classroom design to accommodate 12 students and one instructor station. Plans are underway to expand the classroom to 24 stations and a second training site in Kaohsiung. AMERICAN SYSTEMS will be installing these classroom trainers in Taiwan this summer. The next phase of the program will be the development of the SAMT-type of virtual maintenance trainer.
